Sale of these products is currently targeted at Japanese tourists visiting Hong Kong and is conducted primarily through Kanpoyakudo (PUT IN CHINESE NAME), a retail outlet of the Group in Hong Kong ...'.

'Leveraging on its success in Hong Kong, the Group plans to establish three additional distribution outlets in Beijing, Hangzhou and Xian in the PRC (the People's Republic of China) to capture the potential market of Japanese tourists in these cities...'.
