

*My Dear Grandchild*,

Have you noticed that US President George W. Bush knows of only one kind of speech, assuming that he writes his own material, that is. They go like this:

'My fellow Americans (or words to that effect), Iraq must be stopped; Iraq will be stopped; Iraq will be vanquished; we shall prevail ...'
