## THE THREE WIVES OF STANLEY HO HUNG SUN: SHE WHO SLEEPS WITH THIS MAN WAKES UP WITH MILLION\$

Dr Benjamin Franklin (1706-1790) is best known as being one of the 5 drafters of The Declaration of Independence from Great Britain in 1775.
