

My Dear Grandchild,

The world has, always, had terrorists, in one form or another. Today, the most-hated terrorists, as far as the Western World is concerned, are the fundamentalistic Muslims who fight under the flag of al Qaeda whose leader is Osama bin Laden. It was determined by Rome that the defenders of Masada were people who had to be killed in order to reinforce an ancient imperialist superpower's reputation of invincibility.
