

My Dear Grandchild,

I was delighted to see the way in which the US Government treated my President on Friday, January 21, 2011. President Hu Jin Tao () was treated in the manner, befitting the leader of one of the greatest countries in the world, today, and, certainly, it will be one of the greatest countries for many decades to come. Although I must tell you that I did not think very much of the menu that was selected for the dinner that US President Barack Hussein Obama chose on the night that he hosted my President at the White House. After all, the Poet's Leap Riesling (wine) 'Botrytis' is produced from rotting grapes, you know. Botrytis is a fungus that causes plants to catch a disease. Where in history can one find that the government of a country with more than one billion people has raised the standard of living of the average man-in-the-street from near mendicancy to becoming a contributing member of the strongest consuming society in the world? Where in history can one find such a successful government as that of China's? Stupid Americans!'

It is difficult to fault the statements of The Frog because they are quite true ... for a change. But the Americans, as he refers to the citizens of the US, still do not understand, or appreciate, my country and its many peoples. One hears, all the time, of the way in which the Government of China is insensitive to human rights and the rights and the dignity of man; and, that the Government is far from being democratic. The description of China, being a socialist dictatorship of the proletariat, led by the Communist Party, is, to the Americans, an emotive description of a government, the connotation of which is that of a cruel and heartless regime. Nothing could be further from the truth. For the most part, the human population of China endorses the Government because, in truth, as the Americans would say, 'They have never had it so good.' Few people in China need to go hungry, today, unless, such as I, they are overweight and decide to go on a diet.

Criticism is cheap and one can complain about nearly anything, from the warts on The Frog's leg to the change of life of a woman after she is passed her child-bearing years. One should not, however, complain for the sake of complaining. If one feels the need to complain, let the complaint be backed by facts that are indisputable. I see that the trouble with the US Government, today, is that there is just too much ignorance and emotive language, used to strengthen an arguable position that is, for the most part, untenable. It is stated that not all of the fingers of the hand are the same size. So it is for countries' governments because not all governments fit the mould of what the US would state is a democracy.

It is very easy to suggest that Mr Hu Jin Tao is a dictator, but it is an incorrect nomenclature of this good man for he is not, and never has been, a dictator although it is true that he wields a great deal of power at home. The Frog could say the same thing about me, stating that I boss him around and cause him to do what I tell him. This, too, is untrue because I only suggest that he follow my definitive instructions and, failure so to do would, indeed, upset me. He, therefore, is only too happy to follow my suggestions.
