

My Dear Grandchild,

The Tenth Anniversary of the attack on the twin towers of The World Trade Centre at New York has come and gone and, thanks to the security arrangements, put in place by the US Government, Al Qaeda was not able to kill anybody, attending the memorial services in what has come to be known as The Big Apple. rather than permit the Roman Legion the pleasure of killing them. The Torah does not condone suicide so that this was a method of circumventing the teachings of the First Five Books of Moses, also known as The Pentateuch.
