In a country of about 7 million people, all living in a huge desert, measuring about 1.76 million square kilometers, with the only known natural resources, being petroleum, natural gas, gypsum, what would Great Britain and France find so fascinating about this sandy country of North African? As one of the generals on the Parliamentary side in the English Civil War against King Charles I, Oliver Cromwell helped to bring about the overthrow of the Stuart Monarchy, and, as Lord Protector, he raised his country's status once more to that of a leading European power from the decline it had gone through since the death of Queen Elizabeth I.

It is fact, My Dear Grandchild, that power tends to corrupt, and absolute power corrupts, absolutely. John Emerich Edward Dalberg Acton, First Baron, eighth Baronet, who lived from 1834 until his death in 1902, is credited with this observation. Luckily for the world, Messrs Cameron and Sarkozy will not hold onto their respective powers for very long so that they will never by completely corrupted, will they?
