## THE GOOD, AS WITH THE BAD, BECOMES A ROUTINE; THE TEMPORARY TENDS TO ENDURE; THE EXTERNAL PERMEATES TO THE INSIDE; AND, THE MASK, GIVEN TIME, COMES TO BE THE FACE, ITSELF

In 1758, Dr Samuel Johnson, renowned as an English poet, essayist, moralist, and lexicographer, was said to have been the first person to have written that which is contained in the following, very erudite sentence:

'Among the calamities of war may be jointly numbered the diminution of the love of truth, by the falsehoods which interest dictates and credulity encourages.'

Politicians, especially the late Senator Hiram Warren Johnson, a member of The Republican Party, during the time that he was serving as the 23rd Governor of the State of California, have shortened the above statement of Dr Samuel Johnson to the following seven words:

'The First Casualty of War is Truth.'

Governor Hiram Warren Johnson – no relationship to Dr Samuel Johnson, by the way – is quoted as having stated the above sentence in 1916.

Nothing is new under the sun, of course, but one is reminded of the sage words of Publius Aelius Hadrianus (76 AD to 136 AD), an Emperor of Rome, who stated, more than 1,881 years ago:

'Each of us dedicates himself to his own gods.'

Today, one is told by the most-powerful leader of the free world, to wit, President Donald John Trump, that he is not just the President of The United States of America, but, in his inimitable language, he is a modern-day President.

He went on record, stating the following in the social media of the day:

'My use of social media is not Presidential – it's MODERN DAY PRESIDENTIAL. Make America Great Again!'

Whether or not President Donald John Trump will be remembered for coining the above statement is questionable.

It would, however, be much more advantageous that, in the place of those 16 words, recorded – if they must – with regard to the testament of this loquacious and bombastic leader of the free world, for the Presidents who follow him, when his body is encased in a casket and left with sod, being his eternal blanket, that he is able to leave, as a lasting legacy, something more inspirational.
